GET CONNECTED


The easiest way to stay in the loop for emergency warnings is to sign up for notifications through Clackamas County's public alert system. You can choose to receive text messages, emails or phone calls so you will feel confident that you receive important and timely information in case of

emergency. This could include evacuation instructions, notice of a planned power shutoff, or additional safety information.

PLAY SAFE: BE AWARE OF CLOSURES

Years after a wildfire, its effects can continue to impact natural areas and recreation opportunities. Before you head out for a picnic, hike, paddle or bike ride please check for closures or impacted areas and plan accordingly.

In Clackamas County, many closures (as of fall 2021) are on national lands including the Mt. Hood National Forest (US Forest Service) and Bureau of Land Management (BLM) land.

Campfire safety is fire safety - always check for burn bans! You can find burn information at **clackamasfire.com/outdoor-burning-notice/.** Please note that burn rules may be different on public lands, so check the website for any state or county park, National Forest or BLM area you plan to visit.

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KNOW EVACUATION PROTOCOLS

Be fire aware, and know how to look for signs that can keep you safe. When you check your weather app, scroll down to the Air Quality (AQI). Bad air quality, or notice midday getting darker? It could be due to nearby wildfires - best to check. Is a flurry of sirens interrupting your relaxing forest stroll? Check for any fire warnings in the area.

Check the Clackamas County wildfire and evacuation map. It shows active fires as well as areas that have evacuation warnings of Level 1, 2 and 3:



If you're on vacation, it probably won't be too difficult to pack up your things in case of evacuation. But make sure you have essentials like medications and water for your group, and that you know where to go.
